also requires an audition, and plays some of the most difficult literature available.

Auditions are also necessary for the Percussion class and the Jazz Chiefs. The Percussion class forms the drumline and frontline for the marching band. Percussionists also perform with different band concerts and give their own percussion concert in Spring. The Jazz Chiefs are a 25 member Big Band that perform a wide range of literature from straight-ahead swing to funk and fusion charts. The jazz band gives several concerts to our school and community and is also regarded as one of the best in the state.

Auditions are held in the spring when Ms. Newhouse and I visit the local middle school bands. Incoming percussion and out of zone students should contact the band office to set up an audition time.

Seminole High School has more musical opportunities than any other school in Seminole County. Other music opportunities include: general music theory, A.P. music theory, I.B. music theory, show choirs and orchestra.

Seminole also has the newest music building in the county, providing our students with a state-of-the-art Performing Arts Center to showcase their talents. Checking with the band website is also a good idea to stay up on any information and dates for band camp. It really is a great website!!!

As the band director and teacher at Seminole High School our goal is quite simple, give our students the best we can. I look forward to meeting you and watching as you become a member of the Pride of the Tribe!



Sun Safety

Due to the large number of hours our band students spend in the dangerous summer sun, we are very concerned about the long-term health of their skin. It is essential that every student take steps every day NOW to protect their skin from the damaging UV rays of the sun. Dermatologists are seeing an increase in younger and younger patients with skin cancers caused by sun-exposure.

1. Apply sunscreen 30 mins before every practice.
 - Make sure that your sunscreen says it is BROAD SPECTRUM. UV-B rays mainly cause burning. UV-A rays penetrate the skin more deeply and are responsible for wrinkles AND the beginnings of skin cancer.
 - Is SPF 45 or higher
 - contains avobenzone (Parsol 1789) plus ecamsule (Mexoryl). These are the only two approved ingredients for protecting against UV-A rays.
2. Wear a wide-brimmed hat to cover your face and back of the neck — visors are not adequate as they do not protect your ears or the sensitive skin of your neck.
3. Wear a T-shirt with sleeves. Tank tops provide zero protection to your shoulders. Think of the cultures that wear long flowing robes to keep cool when the temps hit 110 degrees! And do you really want a dermatologist digging up cancerous moles from your skin 10 years from now?

Take every precaution now so that your skin remains healthy and safe a few years from now. You are worth it! More information on Sun Safety is available at the band's website www.seminolehsband.org



My student has never marched before! How will he/she handle band camp?

On the Saturday before band camp, all first-time marchers, affectionately called "Gunkies," will learn the fundamentals of marching. They will be instructed by band leadership — Drum majors, the Band Captain, the Woodwind and Brass Captains, section leaders, line leaders. This half-day will get them ready for the first full day of band camp.

What is a typical day of band camp?

In the morning, students will work on marching fundamentals. As it warms up, they will head indoors and learn the music. They will be divided by instruments (saxophone section together, flute section together etc). They will then rehearse as a full band. After dinner, when it is cooler, the students will go to the field and learn the marching routines.

What about food during band camp?

Students can bring a boxed dinner from home. More typically, they can purchase a dinner brought in by the Band Parents at cost. This is typically a rotation of Chick fil-A, hamburgers, pizza and subs. Students must sign up and pay for these meals ahead of time, which include a cold drink, chips and dessert.

I hear it is hot in Florida in the summer. What about hydration?

Yes, it has been rumored to get a little warm. It is essential that students drink plenty of fluids at home, and bring lots of water during band camp and rehearsals. When practicing outside, students are given ample water breaks. You have already seen the separate article about the importance of wide-brimmed hats, sunscreen and T-shirts that cover the shoulders.

Students have found that filling a hydration pack (Camel back) with only ice cubes in the morning results in water that is still cool for after-school rehearsals during the school year. However, any insulated water container will work well!

What is included in my band dues?

For a first-time marcher, band dues include: a "continuity" shirt (a T-shirt featuring this year's half-time show,) black mesh shorts, black uniform shoes (Dinkles), a black band polo shirt, gloves and a flip folder. Students have the option of buying additional clothing. Band dues also cover the marching hat, dry-cleaning the marching and concert uniforms several times a year, the cost of music, entry fees to festivals etc.

What happens on Fridays when there is a football game?

When school is dismissed at 2:10, students are free. They should eat lunch before they have to report for Continuity at approximately 4 pm. They must be wearing their continuity T-shirt, shorts and Dinkles, and will practice their half-time show on the field.

After practice, students line up to pick up their assigned band uniforms, and put it on over their continuity T-shirt and shorts. Students typically dress in the band room, so the continuity wear provides modesty. Students then line up by section and present themselves for a thorough inspection, to make sure that they have full uniform and gloves, no jewelry of any kind, long black socks and black uniform shoes (Dinkles.) Students then either march into the home stadium or board buses for away games. They do not take any backpacks with them, only their instruments and some spending money for the break during the 3rd quarter. Students can take off their jackets in the buses. While chaperones are present and watchful, the entire band is

under the leadership of Band Council.

How will I know what is going on with the band program?

We have developed many effective ways to keep students and parents informed every step of the way. The band website, www.seminolehsband.org, is updated frequently and is key in keeping you current. It is also a great source for photos of your student in action. The band's newsletter the Band Beat is mailed home several times a year. The Noles News, SHS's newsletter, is mailed home every 9 weeks.

In addition to the flyers that are sent home with students, the Band Parent Assn. emails announcements as needed. You will need to sign up for this mailing list at the website's home page or through your Band Parent Assn. membership form.

You are also welcome to attend the Board meetings that are held on the 2nd Tuesday of every month.

As a parent, how can I help?

Cool Band Parents are the backbone of the band, and there are many ways that you can get involved. The first way is to join the Band Parent Assn. Your dues help the band's budget, and you get a free booster T-shirt to wear to football games!

How much you get involved depends your time and energy. You can chaperone the band during football games, help in the concession stands when needed, serve as a committee member or chair, help with fundraising, help in the band office (or be crazy enough to do all of the above. Don't laugh — it happens!) A complete list of all volunteer opportunities is listed with the BPA Membership form, and is also posted at the website under Cool Band Parents.

As a chaperone, you will need to sign up as a Dividend at SCPS's website. Please do this in July. You have to register annually.

We encourage new band parents to volunteer during band camp. This is a great time to meet other parents, learn about the program and be present during your student's first days in high school.

How do I sign up to chaperone a game on football Friday?

First of all, please sign up for the band's mailing list, either on the website or through your membership form. The Coordinator of Volunteers regularly sends out requests for chaperones, selected on a first-replied-first-selected basis. You will be notified if you are selected. On the day of the game, come to the band corridor at the designated report time and pick up your chaperone tag. You will be instructed about your assignment for that day.

The good news is that Band Leadership is in charge of managing student behavior. We have other specific support roles such as transporting the coolers of iced drinks, passing them out to the students when the students reach the stands, passing out the plumes for their hats before the half-time show, and making sure the stands are clean as the students leave the stadium.

Do you really like new band families as much as you say you do?

Absolutely! We are so glad that you are going to be a Seminole!!

For Parents: A Place to Belong

As your student enters high school, many parents who were active in elementary school and middle school are wondering how they can stay involved with their child's education in high school.

Band is the place! Seminole Band has the largest and most active parent organization on campus. Our Cool Band Parents typically volunteer over 6000 hours each year, and help in ways that fit their interests and hours that fit their schedule. Many of us have chosen "Band" to be our home base on campus.

A membership form for the Band Parent Association is enclosed in this newsletter. Your dues will help pay the band's expenses, and you will receive a free T-shirt to wear to games! Due to the size of the band, we need chaperones for every football game in the fall. We have many committees that are short-term and long-term. The full list of committees is posted on the Cool Band Parent page of the band website.

You might also consider chaperoning during Band Camp. This is a great time to meet other Cool Band Parents and get a sense of the music program. Band camp is 9 am—9 pm for a whole week, you can sign up for whatever day(s) and shift(s) that are convenient for you.

We look forward to meeting prospective Cool Band Parents. Welcome to Seminole Band!

- Light colored T-shirts. Tank tops not recommended.
- White T-shirt for one rehearsal day per week (does not have to be plain white — designs OK)
- Covered shoes for marching, with socks. No sandals or flip flops on the field
- Light-colored shorts, of light-weight material. It is very hot on the field — thick cotton jean shorts will be UNcomfortable. Girls, please keep school dress code standards in mind.
- Earscrews for percussion (earplugs)
- Accessories in school colors of orange and black

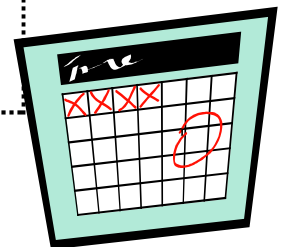

Dressing for School Spirit

We are the Band, and we are an essential part of stirring school spirit and creating excitement during football season. Every Friday afternoon when there is a home varsity football game, the band participates in a pep rally for the school. Band members change into their continuity clothes for the pep rally, and will often add accessories in the school colors, orange and black....socks, beads, earrings, ribbons, bracelets.

On regular rehearsal days, students who are not in Leadership are often required to wear white T-shirts. This helps the band directors get a better visual sense of formations on the field. You might want to keep an eye out for summer sales that offer these items.

As an ongoing fundraiser, the Band Parents sell many SHS-themed T-shirts. A catalog of all these items can be found at the website under Forms, Spirit Wear catalog. A favorite for parent-gear as well!

OK — what's life in Band really like?

In terms of schedule:

1. There is after-school rehearsal after school on Wed and Thurs. until 5 pm.
2. On Game Fridays, students report to the band room at 4 or 4:30 pm. They go home after the game between 10 and 11 pm, depending on whether the game is at home or away.
3. On Home Game Fridays, they play at a pep rally at school during the last period.

During concert season, students must attend a few after-school rehearsals in preparation for FBA.

In terms of experience: Your student WILL grow as a musician and a person. We create an environment where quality and craftsmanship are emphasized. Individual music lessons and daily music practice are highly encouraged. Seminole Band is led by students, and your student can develop leadership abilities here. Band students spend a lot of time together, and every year many Seniors say that band becomes their family at SHS, the place where they most "belong". Having Cool Band Parents around helps a lot with that. Students will work hard, they will sweat a lot, they will have a lot of fun, and they will remember this positively forever.

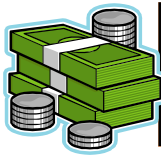

Why the Band needs money, and how we raise it

The school gives us a certain amount every year, but we typically need to raise approximately an **additional \$60,000 per year** to cover the Band's expenses. Here are some of the expenses we incur year round:

- ! guest clinicians during band camp
- ! buying rights to the music that we play during marching season and concert season
- ! renting a moving van for each away game, paying for tolls and gasoline (gasp!)
- ! dry cleaning all marching uniforms, and tuxes and gowns during concert season (several THOUSAND dollars right there!)
- ! entry fees to festivals
- ! catering Senior Night
- ! scholarships for a limited number of students
- ! maintaining school-owned instruments
- ! renting a hall for Band Banquet, and catering.
- ! providing students with a bottle of cold water at each football game

Band camp is mandatory. Please make sure your vacation plans do not conflict with Gunkie Day and Band Camp. Aug 8 - 14.

To pay these bills, the Band Parent Assn. raises funds throughout the year. Here are some of the ways we make it possible for the band to do it's thing:

- dues from membership in the Band Parent Association.
- student Band dues
- selling cheesecakes, Christmas trees, advertising
- silent auction during the winter band concert
- selling cold drinks, snacks and locks during Schedule Pickup
- selling spirit wear at football games
- working in the concession stands. We receive a percentage of the profits from the Seminole Boosters.
- selling photo-CDs and DVDs of the band



In addition to profiting the band, students also receive money in their individual accounts, which can be used to pay for next year's Band Dues. Seniors can use the money towards the Band Trip.

BAND DUES and your share of the 60 Thousand



As you saw in the article above, we typically have to raise approximately \$60,000 a year to fund the band's activities. Each band student's band dues goes towards this amount.

As a band parent and a student musician, your involvement with Seminole Band is a voluntary activity. No one is required to be in band. Conversely, we want anyone who wants to be in band to be able to afford it. You can pay your band dues in one of two ways:

1. Pay them in full on Registration Night. \$200 for returning marchers, \$250 for first-time marchers.
2. On Registration night, make arrangements to pay in two installments. First installment is due on Registration Night, the balance is due on Friday Sept. 25, the home game against Mainland.

If paying band dues presents a hardship, please contact Board Treasurer for Student Accounts Michele Wawoe asap. She will work confidentially with you to work out an arrangement.

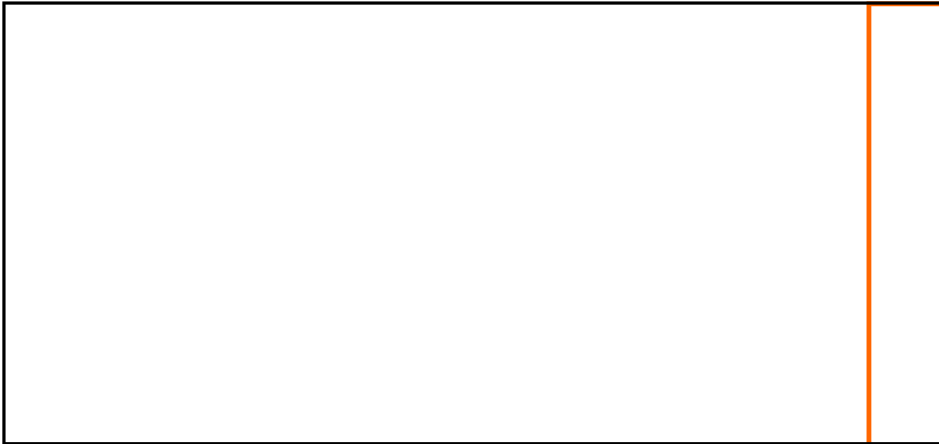

Senior Night: All the Pride of the Tribe Seniors and their parents are honored with a dinner, followed by an introduction to the audience in the stadium.



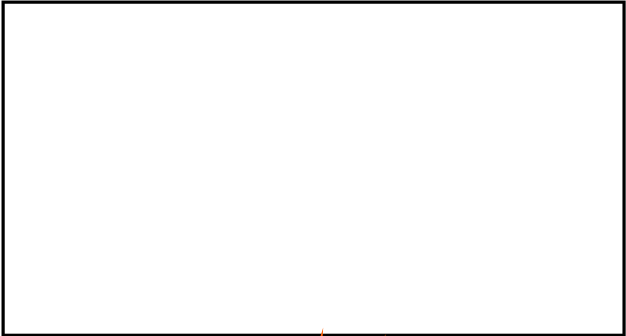
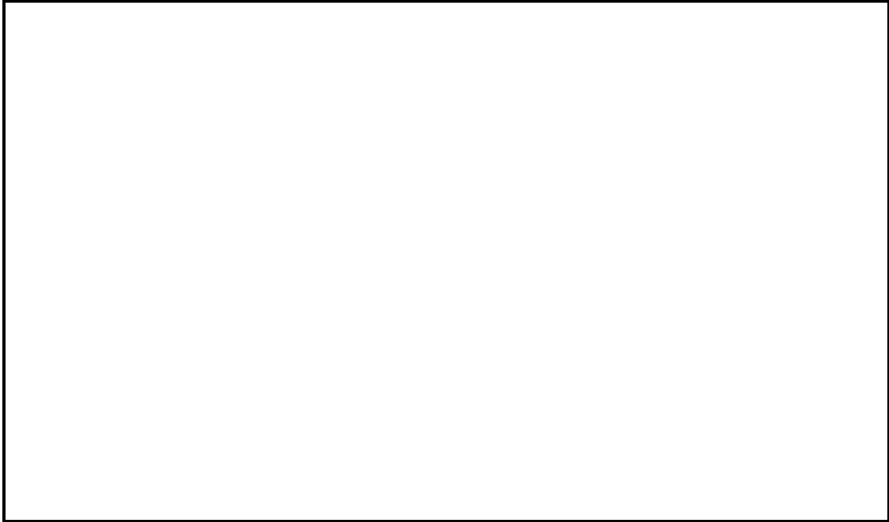
